Siscone hungry for Dog Leg

"Some nights I lie in bed, stare at the ceiling and say to myself 'I don't believe it's really happening to me.' It's got to be a dream," says Hammonton's Tony Siscone.

That dream, however is reality.

Twice a week, Tony Siscone, age 30, college grad (Rider '72), teacher (Absegami High), husband (wife Margie) and father (daughter Jacie), sheds his white shirt, suit and tie, dons uniform and helmet, and, more often than not, winds up in victory lane at Wall Stadium or New Egypt Speedway.

"I USED TO DREAM about stock car racing," Siscone recalls, "I'd hang on the pit fence at Vineland or Old Bridge (speedways) and watch guys like Wally Dallenbach, Richie Massing, Joe Kelly and Bob Rossell.

They were the hot shoes.

"My father (Anthony Sr.) and I used to race go-karts. I really wanted to race stocks, but promised him I wouldn't as long as I was in college. As soon as I graduated, I started racing."

By waiting, he gave his future rivals a

running start. But in his first season, 1972, in the sportsman division at Atlantic City Speedway and Wall Stadium, winning four features at each track.

In 1974, he joined a modified team, the Terrusso Brothers, also of Hammonton.

"I ran for them a couple of years, and was in the top 10 in points. But I never won a feature.

"In 1977, I drove for Frank Ransom and won my first feature, at Wall. It was the first team I drove for that had the money to put into a car.

"IN 1978, I WON the first race," Siscone says enthusiastically. Then, his voice becoming solemn, "The next week Frank died of a heart attack... he was only 47."

It looked as though Siscone's career had come to a joiting stop. Then Dick Barney and Hoyt Morrison called. "I thought it was a wrong number," Siscone laughs. "They've always had the 'hot shoes' — Wally, Richie, Kelly. Rossell was their driver then, so what did they want with me? I was really excited."

Barney and Morrison wanted to race at New Egypt and Wall each week, and Rossell was only interested in the Saturday action at Wall.

Siscone became their New Egypt chauffeur.

Last season, he drove at both tracks, and became a significant factor in the field.

Now he's winning regularly, leads in points at Wall Stadium, is in the top three at New Egypt, and leads the statewide (asphalt) standings.

LIKE ANY DRIVER, he has visions of driving NASCAR Grand Nationals or Indy cars some day. But for now, his goal is to be "the best modified driver in the country."

He could take a step that way tomorrow in the Dog Leg 200 at Trenton Speedway.

Winning at Trenton is no small task. There are 80 rivals, most of them stars.

THAT SHOULDN'T discourage him. Last week he got a vote of confidence from one of the best. Wally Dallenbach, visiting Wall Stadium last Saturday, observed, "He's got all the equipment. He should go a long way if he sticks to it. You know, he drives like (Mario) Andretti did when he was coming up. They're about the same size. They even look alike."

A couple of weeks ago, we made one of our infrequent visits to the New Egypt Speedway and saw what had to be one of the less flattering performances by young John Blewett Jr.

In the heat race, John tangled with a car driven by Joe Gallini and, when the two machines came to rest in the infield, Blewett climbed from his car, ran over to his rival and gave him a piece of his mind.

It was obvious that he thought the other driver had done him wrong.

Blewett, who was pushing for the track driving championship, made it into the feature and drove hard to catch the front runners. A good finish would give him a comfortable lead with only one more race meet remaining.

ONCE AGAIN, HE tangled with another car, this time

winding up scuffing the side of his car against the outside crashwall.

Again, he climbed from the car and this time waved an angry finger at the driver he felt had offended him.

It was an even worse performance by one of the members of a loyal band of Blewett fans in the grandstand. This big kid in a John Blewett jacket stood in front of the grandstand throwing rocks at the "offending" driver in the first incident.

It was a less than gentlemanly performance by the driver nicknamed "Jungle John," and an even more outrageous showing by one of his fans.

At the time, we wondered just how Blewett managed to do as well as he has this season, with those temper tantrums and rather loose driving.

It was not an isolated incident. He was put on indefinite suspension at Wall Stadium this season after punching another driver, Tony Hirschman Jr., following a pair of mishaps on the track. Track officials say they have a tape of one of the incidents, and it suggests that Blewett was the one at fault.

He has since returned to the good graces of Wall pit steward Tom O'Rourke, but his father, John Sr., remains banned from the track.

We went back to New Egypt last Wednesday for the final race of the season, and discovered a totally different John Blewett.

HE QUALIFIED FOR the season-ending 200-lap Tom Grbac Memorial race with a good time trial run, then managed to grab the No. 1 pill in the luck-of-the-draw selection for the starting lineup.

He then proceeded to drive an aggressive but very skillful race, holding off two of the best chargers in modified racing, Geoff Bodine and Richie Evans. It was a demonstration of skill and determination; and it underlined the fact that, faced with a real challenge, Blewett could rise above petty bickering. He won the race and, in so doing, wrapped up the 1980 track title.

His two performances were in such startling contrast that it almost seemed as though a different person had climbed behind the wheel.

Blewett has shown flashes of brilliance in his relatively short career in the asphalt modifieds. He has the skills that can carry him a long way if he manages to harness his temper.

He has shown both skill and bad judgment in the past. Hopefully, the maturing process will lift him to the level of a consistenly top-caliber driver in the near future.

He has the skill and the desire, and there's always room at the top for that kind of man. But tempers will have to be harnessed not only his temper, but that of his band of boosters.

For, no matter how good a driver may be, if he can't play it cool at the track, he doesn't beling behind the wheel, and a man's rooters frequently reflect his attitude.



Evans: Consistency makes him one impressive driver

NEW EGYPT — Of the hundreds of drivers who compete on racetracks in this area, none is quite so impressive in as Richie Evans.

That is saying quite a bit, since most the nation's finest pilots make at least one showing each year in the east. We have the chance to watch racers from the CART Indy car circuit, NASCAR's Grand National tour and IMSA's Camel GT series, to mention the three most prominent. This is in addition to all the sprint, midget, modified and sportsman drivers who run on a host of short tracks in the area.

We are offered the opportunity to watch the likes of Richard Petty, Darrell Waltrip, Bobby Allison, A.J. Foyt, the Unser brothers, and the father-and-son team of John Paul Sr. and Jr., to mention just a few whose names pop into the mind when you discuss class operations in auto racing.

The thing that leads me to "vote" for Evans is the way he gets the job done. He is, perhaps, the most consistent competitor in the sport.

All of the others I've named have had good years and bad. Evans always seems to be at top of his game. How many times has he been the NASCAR modified national champ? Five overall, four in a row.

The modified championship is quite different than most of the other national titles. It is based on points awarded at many tracks for many races. In contrast, the other top

circuits have no conflicting dates and run a comparative handful of races— 30 in NASCAR GN, a dozen or so in CART and IMSA, all neatly spaced, so that the crews have time to rework the cars after each race.

Evans routinely runs twice as many races as his Grand National brothers, four or five times as many as his Indy car cousins. He frequently races two or three times a week.

It is a brutal routine which can wear out the tougest of men.

Evans would be the first to admit that he is not "perfect" every time out. But he is so good so often that he shifts the odds into his favor simply by throwing his driving gloves on the crashrail.

Part of the Evans secret of success is his attention to detail. His car always is in top condition. Also, at age 42, he has accumulated vast experience on most of the tracks he visits, and usually has his car "set up" right.

His driving skills are second to none.
There is still one other part. Lady
Luck seems to be riding in the
passenger seat.

Friday night's race at New Egypt Speedway is an example of all those facets working together to add another chapter to the Evans mystique.

The event was the "Winston 100" a 100-lap race which was part of the new Budwiser series.

Evans thought he was going to

outsmart the competition by underinflating his right rear tire. He figured that, since it was a relatively long race, the tire would heat up, the air would expand, and the car handle better as the laps wore on.

But the heat expansion did not occur—at least, not enough. So, instead of steering through the turns of the little, quarter-mile asphalt oval, Evans found himself forcing the car to slide through the corners. It was not a textbook performance, and yet the car looked good and ran well, even with all the sliding.

Despite this handicap, Evans gradually edged his way up from the ninth starting spot until he had passed everyone except front-running John Blewett Jr.

By then, though, there were only five laps remaining and Blewett had a straightaway lead over Evans. It seemed as if Blewett had this one in the bag.

Lady Luck had a different idea.
With four laps to go, Blewett went
into the first turn and began to slither
around the track, obviously in trouble.

Evans pounced on the opportunity. In lap 97 he took the lead from Blewett, while the Lakewood driver was busy fighting his car.

Blewett slowed even more, and now he was blocking the path of the others who still were pursuing Evans.

At the checkered flag, it was Evans by a straigntaway over runner-up Wayne Anderson. Evans wrote the whole thing off as luck. But it was more than that. Had the Rome, N.Y., driver been anything less than a talented, stubborn fellow who forced his car do things it didn't want to do—such as turn left—he would not have been in a position to take advantage of Blewett's misfortune. Were Evans not the kind of driver who is capable of "seeing" what is going on far ahead of him on the track, and then acting to anticipate trouble, he more than likely would have been caught among the also-rans.

I've seen more than one good driver in a similar situation, with an illhandling car, simply pull of the track and say "To heck with it."

But Evans stuck to his task. That's something beyond talent and luck. That's dedication.

By competing in the season-opening stock car race on the seashore area's 1/4-mile asphalt oval, Hearne made it 25 years of racing.

It all began on Memorial Day of 1957. His first race was at the Hialeah (Fla.) Speedway.

Gil made his northern debut in 1961, at Wall Stadium. His first track title came in 1964 — at New Egypt Speedway.

For the past dozen years, Gil has been a Wall Stadium regular. Before long, he was a top competitor there, and won back-to-back track titles in 1973 and '74.

Even with all his experience, Gil still gets a thrill when the green flag drops. And don't get the impression that the years have slowed him down.

He won back-to-back track championships at Wall in '77-'78 and came back again last season to win his fifth track crown, beating runner up Charlie Kremer Jr. by a solid 150 points (1088 to 938).

All five of Gil's championships at the Stadium came behind the wheel of Tom Dirkin race cars. Hearne drove for Dirkin for 12 years. But this season Gil is going it alone.

"It could be a tough year," he told us, "because I don't have a sponsor right now, and you know how

expensive it is to run a race car these days. But I'll run as long as the money holds out, and I'm still looking (for a sponsor)."

Hearne does a lot of the work on the car himself, but has a half-dozen friends who pitch in. "It's the same crew I've had for years," he explained.

Hearne's car for '82 will be a Geoff Bodine-built Pinto that Gil bought in '79 and which he jas run "about 10 times," at major tracks and extra-distance races.

"It's not real fancy; it doesn't have the offset or anything trick, but it's a solid, reliable car," Hearne said.

He plans to concentrate his racing on Wall Stadium, and possibly some of the New Egypt Speedway events, this season, if the equipment holds up.

"I know that the big tracks and the long distance races are where the money is, but it's also where the competition's toughest," said Hearne. "After I bought the car in '79, I tried some of the long races. You can win a lot on money, but it costs a lot to travel to places like Martinville (Va.) and to stay for a weekend at a time. It just didn't work out too well."

. .

Last season, en route to the Wall championship, Gil won seven feature events — meaning he won just over 28 percent of the 24 modified feature races. In the season opener last week, he came home sixth.

Wall had three divisions last season — modified,

sportsman and modern — with a total of 71 feature events. Only Tom Mauser, who wound up with the sportsman crown, came anywhere near Hearne's performance. Mauser had six feature wins.

In the modified division, Jamie Tomaino had five feature wins, including the season-ending "Turkey Derby," but only placed fourth in the driver standings.

Other modified winners were: Charlie Kremer Jr., three; Tony Siscone, Tommy Comerford and Vinnie Green, two each, and one apiece for Don Stives (the extra-distance Garden State Classic), Jeff Taylor and "Chargin' Charlie" Jarzombek. (Jarzombek, the Long Island ace, batted 1.000 for the season, winning the only Wall Stadium event he entered.)

Other multiple winners among the Sportsman drivers were Bob Knee, four, and two apiece for Ed Senkewicz and Jeff Wolcott.

Multiple winners in the Modern division were the champ, Lee Taylor, and Bernie Bailey, four apiece, and two each or Butch Colsimo and Harold Dauncey

Among the notable events at Wall last season was the arrival of Wally Dallenbach Jr., who, following in his Indy-car driving father's footsteps, ran eight stock car events at Wall. Wally Jr. is expected back again this season.

Perhaps the most unusual competitor at Wall last season was Bill Wishnick, who is chairman of the board of the Kendall Oil Co. He won one feature in the Modern division.

Evans got his points across

This year's asphalt track modified stock car racing season in New Jersey was mostly a three-man affair — Richie Evans, Tony Siscone and Jamie Tomaino.

Evans, the NASCAR modified superstar, eked out the narrowest of victories in the driver point race at New Egypt Speedway, the state's only NASCAR track.

The Rome, N.Y., veteran finished the year with 418 points, only four better than Siscone. Tomaino was a distant third with 264 points.

Evans' New Egypt points, plus a similar championship at the Shangri La Speedway at Owego, N.Y., helped carry him to the Budweiser Divisional title and the new NASCAR's Northeast Regional championship. He started 74 races eligible for Bud points, and won 23 of them. It's his sixth divisional crown, five of them in the past five seasons. George Kent of Horseheads, N.Y., was runner-up, more than 1,200 points behind Evans' 4,716 tallies.

Siscone made up for his New Egypt disappointment by locking up the driving crown at Wall Stadium, which is not a NASCAR track.

The Hammonton driver had 1,068 points, 62 more than runner-up Tomaino, who hails from Tinton Falls.

In the races-won category, Evans had six, all at New Egypt, while Siscone had nine — four at NES and five at Wall. Of the Wall wins, two were biggies — the Garden State Classic 200 and the Budweiser Crown Classic.

The season came to a horrible end for Siscone on Oct. 31 when his car crashed in flames in a modified stock car race at the Martinsville (Va.) Speedway. Tony still is recovering from second and third degree burns he suffered on his hands.

Tomaino had five wins at Wall and one at New Egypt.

Three New Egypt feature wins went to John Blewett Jr. of Lakewood, and all three were major events — the season-opening "100," An August 100-lapper and the Tom Grbac Memorial 200.



This is the first in a series of reports on the final standings at area speedways for the 1983 auto racing season.

Modified stock car ace Tony Siscone scored a double last season at New Jersey's two asphalt tracks, Wall Stadium and New Egypt Speedway.

It was particularly impressive in that Siscone was on the comeback trail after suffering severe burns of both hands in a racing crash at the Martinsville, Va., Speedway at the end of 1962.

Although 12 different drivers won features at Wall during the '83 campaign. Siscone was not among them. But the talented chauffeur from Hammonton was so consistently among the top five finishers that he took the seasonal championship for the second time in as many years.

At New Egypt, a NASCARsanctioned track he won three feature races and ran away with the title. beating runnerup Tom Mauser of Farmingdale by a solid 94 points, 366 to 272

Siscone's regular mount at both tracks was the Welsh Farms-sponsored No. 14 owned by Dick Barney and Hoyt Morrison.

John Blewett Jr. of Lakewood also had three feature wins and was third in the New Egypt point standings.

THE "RAPID ROMAN." Richie Evans of Rome, N.Y., was busy seeking NASCAR's national and regional titles. so he wasn't a New Egypt regular. Still he won two features and was 10th in points.

Extra-distance features went to Hirschman (Garden State Classic 200). Lenny Boyd (Memorial Day 150), and Eddie Bohn (Turkey Derby). Single. regular feature wins went to Tom Mauser, Rich Rigsby and Barney Truex.

New Egypt's Modern Stock Division seasonal title went to Frank Fegel Jr. of Oceanville, who had two feature wins but edged out Bob Howard of Matawan for the crown despite Howard's four triumphs. It was Fegel's career first track championship. Harold Dauncey was the only other double winner.

The Mini-Modified Division crown at New Egypt went to Keith Roberts of Pittsfield, Mass. He won seven features while chalking up his first track title at New Egypt.
