





Newark, N. J., April 2—Stock car racing opened its second season yesterday at Ruppert Stadium with indications that this year's campaign of gas-buggy mania will outdo last year's successful inaugural when 208,403 attended 43 meets.

Compared to the 5,201 at hand for the 1950 opener, a surprising total of 7,271 crowded into the Wilson Avenue plant vesterday to watch Johnny Luzi, former Newarker now oper-

ating out of Bloomfield, take advantage of a few breaks to win the 25lap feature. It was a case of beginning where he left off for Luzi, who copped the top event in last year's closing meet.







Kempf Collects Top Dollar at Ruppert

Newark, N.J., Aug. 9—Rex Kempf put the brakes on Wally Campbell, the Trenton speed demon, by winning the 25-lap feature stock car race at Ruppert Stadium last night.
