

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Bayonne Stock Race Goes to Joe Staiger

Bayonne, N. J. July 28th-Whirling around this great 1-5 mile hardsurfaced speedway for 25 laps, to set a new track record in the time of 7 min. 11 seconds. Joe Straiger of Stamfor, Conn. won over a classy field of USCRC pilots. His victory did not come as too great a surprise to Oil City fans as Staiger has shown excellent form in his previous meets at this track. The Stamford speedster was possibly aided by a stroke of good fortune when Al Kellar, kingpin of Bayonne stock car races, spun on the second turn in the 16th lap. Kellar had worked himself up into a challenging third position at the time of his mishap and was giving indications of improving his situation when he momentarily lost control of his racer. No one was injured but Kellar was out of competition.

Interesting too, were the performances of two other drivers, namely Ray Nestor and Johnny Gebo, Nestor, former outstanding midget driver, made his initial entry in a neat brand new blue and white No. 30 sedan in the 2nd heat. Ray took it easy, getting the feel of the track and competitive racing. In the second semi Nestor really let loose to win the event over such stalwarts as Kellar and Magiacomo. Ray also drove well in the feature finishing a good fifth.

Gebo, who had been slithering the silver no. 2 rather widly in the preliminary heats, found himself in a very good spot in the feature race, settled down to some remarkably steady driving. His reward was third money in the feature 25 lapper.

Another thrilling moment occurred when Johnny Hague, leading in the 15 lap 2nd. semi, blew a tire as he entered the homestretch on his 12th. lap. His No. 52 went into a careening broadside which carried it halfway along the straightaway. Rague handled the mount masterfully, sliding to the infield without damage.

Attendance at Bayonne is holding up well. The track is always in tiptop shape and the programs are run off with efficiency by all concerened. ARDC midgets Monday evenings and stock car races every Thursday night. First events promptly at 8:30.

Mike Nazaruk In Bayonne Sweep

Bayonne, N. J. July 25—Mike Nazaruk, who hails from East Meadows, L. I., piloted the neat red and white No. 25 Plakstis Offy to three victories on this fast, dry, one-fifth mile oval here tonight.

More than 4,000 midget racing fans saw Nazaruk streak into the lead on the seventh lap, after starting in to the position, of the first heat. In achieving this, Mike had to overtake such competition as Jim De Marco, George Flemcke, Art Cross, and Don Morris. Again, in the 1st semi, Nazaruk was placed in the handicapped rear of the field, but blasted his wa, past stars like Steve McGrath, De Marco, and Bonadies. This, not simple feat, took him 8 laps to ac-

complish, and victory was sweet.

The feature race was a sizzler all the way. Fourteen cars lined up, the speediest Offenhausers in the rear. Fred Peters, pole man, set sail in an early lead which he held until the fifth circuit at which time he was taken by Tony Bonadies, who was driving his own No. 7 Ford. Bonadies drove splendidly holding onto first place until the 14th lap, when Nazaruk — had moved up from 12th took him on the third turn. During this time, Nick Fornora in the Allen Offy wasn't napping and he too

pressed both Nazaruk and Bonadies very closely. Others were also in the thick of the fight, so that the leader, Nazaruk, had five determined drivers right on his tail. Those who had poined the melee were De Marco. Bill 1 Schindler, driving a strange car, Russ Klar, and Steve McGrath. The remaining ten laps of the event provided the type of racing for which Bayon - is becoming famous. The closely bunched leaders whirled around at a dizzy pace, and not for a moment: could the outcome be predicted. However, Mazaruk drove skillfully to keep ! his Offy '- front, and six cars whizzed ' past Myke Collins' checkered flag in rapid succession.

Schneider Shines In Hectic Nite at Bayonne

BAYONNE, N. J., May 9th—Promoter Ray Flannagan was in the market today for hired help as he was faced with the task of rebuilding almost the entire fence, which was destroyed at the Veteran's Park Stadium Friday night by a large field of stock car drivers in the opening show of the season.

In a wild night of racing, the drivers almost ran themselves into Newark Bay as they provided a night of spills, chills and thrills that will be long remembered by some 2,000 customers.

The crashes and overturned cars overshadowed the spectacular performances turned in by Frank Schneider, who roared his way to victory in the feature 25-lap event, turning back one of the strongest fields ever assembled at one track on the same evening.

No less than 10 of the 65 contesting cars crashed through the guard rails and two turned over as the drivers went all out to help themselves to part of the prize fund. Fortunately, not one of the daredevils suffered serious injuries.

Schneider, one of the topflight drivers in the country, had a rough battle to gain the nod. Trailing during the first seven laps of the main event, he pushed Wally Campbell, who was setting the pace, through the guard rail and into the fence to take the lead. And, once Frank was in front, there was no stopping him although Johnny Cabral fought him right down to the finish line.

Fred Post set the pace during the first six laps but lost it on the seventh to Campbell who remained in front only for one lap as Schneider came in on the inside, hooked onto Wally's car, and shoved him right out of

contention. Campbell managed to get his car back on the track but he had lost a lap and was never in the running again.

Charles Dyer copped third with Post, Len Brown, Joe Romer and Gordon Oldford finishing in that order. The time was seven minutes, 20.76 seconds.

Cabral missed scoring a sweep by failing to take the main event. He led the field home in the first heat and also in the initial semi-final. In both events, Johnny rode heady races.


In the first semi, Al Peters took second place with Romer, Charley Muscatell, I'ost and Schneider earning the other berths for the finals. Dyer led the field in the second with Oldford, Gebe Stonewell, Dodd, Campbell and Brown gaining the right to compete in the finals.

Al Pompanio and Tom Berry paced the field home in the Consolation and in the Class B events, Dick Stanford and Pete Frazee captured top honors."

Pompanio won the second qualifying heat, Brown took the third and Dyer the fourth.

The youthful DuBois nearly scored a clean sweep last week when he placed second in the feature 25 lap event after staging a great duel with the veteran Ralph Sheeler but just could not squeeze through as Sheeler nursed his lead to the finish.

Now that he has returned to his favorite speedway. DuBois figures to be tougher than ever at Bayonne. The youngster, feared by many of the oldest competitors because he isn't afraid to take gambles, has become one of the most popular showmen in the stock car racing profession today.

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Competition should also be rough for Schneider tonight with another star studded field set to display their ability at fence-busting. Also looking for a clean sweep and two feature wins in a row, Schneider was just nosed out of third place last week by Bob Courtwright, a teammate of DuBois in the W. O. Taylor racing stable.

ARDC Pilots to Vie At Bayonne

BAYONNE, N. J., June 6th — Roar of mighty motored midget auto racing cars will split the air for the first time this season on Monday night, June 12, on Bayonne's famous quarter-mile speedway at Veterans Stadium, West 25th St., when a star-studded field of the country's top drivers, converge on this fastest midget racing oval in the east to usher in the 1950 season under the banner of the American Racing drivers Club.

According to Promoter Roy Flannagan, at least a dozen Offenhauser-powered midgets will answer the swish of the starter's flag when the first midget auto race meet in the metropolitan area is presented. In the past the Bayonne track was limited to six definite Offy entries in each meet, with drivers voting on the eligibility of any additional entries that may show up at race time.

Flanagan reports that he has been able to knock these barriers down when he signed his current contract with contest board officials of the ARDC. He further added that he already has the signed entry of such outstanding performers as Steve McGrath, Al Keller, Tony Bonadies, Johnny Zeke, Buddy Chase, Charlie Either. Mike Nazaruk, Russ Klar and Dutch Schaeffer, all driving fast Offenhausers.

Fornoro Takes 1st Money at Bayonne

The initial ARDC program of the current midget racing season was presented here tonight. Promoter Ray Flannagan assembled the fine field of fast cars and drivers, which appeared at the hard-surfaced 1/5th mile speedway.

Nick Fornora, the ace from Whippany, N. J., set the fastest time trial as he barrelled the fleet blue No. 18 Offy around in 14,85. Close behind were Henry Renard (Lynch Offy No. 10) in 14.89, and Art Cross (No. 78 Offy) in 14.98. Twenty two others trailed in very close speeds, and handicaps were arranged for the first heat. The event was taken by "Dutch" Schaeffer, (Caruso Offy No. 2), as he sensationally grabbed victory, on the 3rd turn of the last lap, from Walt Fair. The second race of the evening was won by Renard whose drive from 8th to 1st in two laps gave him a lead he never relinquished. Fred Peters took the next 10 lap heat,, giving the red and yellow No. 14 Offy a fast ride. Fornora came back to annex the first semi, of 15 laps, when he passed Andy VanHusen and Len Duncan on the 12th. In the following semi Fred Peters came through for a fine performance. The class 'B' race went to Johnny Kay, and the consolation to Mike Nazaruk, the latter just fresh in from a mid-west campaign.

Feature Race.

Fourteen cars started the event, nine of them fast Offies. Fornora, who had commenced in fifth place, took over the lead on the third lap, and drove a fast hard race to keep the position for the remainder of the distance. The Whippany speedster won by 15 feet over Len Duncan who was at the wheel of the Hickey Offy. A great three way battle for third spot, developed early and continued right down to the wire. The contestants were Schaeffer (Caruso Offy No. 2), Nazaruk, (Caruso Offy No. 10).

Bayonne, N. J., Aug. 15—Sam Dodd seemed to have the feature stock race in the bag last night at the Bayonne Stadium, when Johnny Cabral started his move to victory and slipped through on the inside to garner the coveted first position and race.

Dodd was clicking off the laps in rapid fashion and started his 22nd circuit with but three laps to go to the finish. It was on this lap that Cabral poured on the coal and took over the lead to score in the 25-lap event. When Cabral moved up Tony Battle rode right on his rear wheels and Dodd had to be content with third place honors. The finish was Cabral, Battle, Dodd, Mallach, Barbiche and Krunyk. Time for the 25 laps was 7:27.87.

Cole Wins Bayonne'50 9/13/1950

By BILL DUHRKE Bayonne, N. J., Sept. 4-The Atlantic Stock Car Racing Club brought out the largest, and fastest field of cars and drivers it has yet presented at this Bayonne Speedway. The largest crowd of 1950 was constantly thrilled as the power-packed lineups

whirled around the 1/5th mile as-

phalt bowl in ten exciting events.

There were innumerable spins, tangles, and fence smashing, in the preliminary heats, but no one was injured. A spectacular mishap occurred in the 2nd class "B" when Doug Hamilton, riding deep in the third turn, rolled over sideways several times, coming to rest on the outer rail. Though the car was out of action, Hamilton waved that he was OK.

Starter Henry Steiger dropped the green bunting on 20 fast roaring pilots for the 50 lap feature. They zoomed into the first turn, with Johnny Kronyiak, Lyle Eastman, and Chuck Arnold pressed by 17 determined racers. On the second lap Tony Battle pushed into third place. Arnold had moved up a spot and As they entered the fourth lap, in the northeast turn, Arnold went into a spin and the resulting confusion was hectic. Cars dashed in all directions, to the degree that the track was completely blocked, whereupon Steiger waved the red flag, bringing the race to a halt.

The event was restarted, as of the fourth lap, and Kronyiak, once more, sailed into the lead. By the sixth circuit, however, Paul Barbiche took over, and Neil Cole followed him right through the traffic into second spot. These two stars engaged in one of the greatest duels ever seen at Bayonne, At the halfway mark, of 25 laps, the order was Barbiche, Cole, Russ Dodd, Tony Battle, Frankie Schneider, Al DeAngelo, Cabral, and the balance of the field. On the 34th time around, Schneider took Battle, but the main interest was in the Barbiche-Cole struggle which was still raging. Barbiche was gunning for his third straight victory, at this track, when he came round for the 35th lap. As he entered the fourth turn, his car burst a right front tire, and he fought to keep the careening mount between fences. By great driving, Barbiche controlled the car but his aspirations for a win were shattered. This gave Cole the lead, which he held down to the finish line, to earn the plaudits of the crowd.

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
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BAYONNE AUTO RACES — PAST AND PRESENT

Bayonne has long been famed as natural outlets for sport-minded people. The resources of this section have provided for the sports enthusiast wonderful inducements in the way of baseball, football, tennis and swimming.

Yet, with all its sporting assets and advantages, both professional and amateur, the Oil City never had the benefits of big time speed sports within its boundaries. It remained for an enterprising young promoter, Ray Flannagan to invade this virgin territory last year, and practically overnight made Veteran's Stadium into one of the major eastern speedways for midget car and stock car racing.

Just how much faith he had, and how well that faith was rewarded, can be gauged py the tremendous enthusiasm that greeted these thrilling speed sports last season. In 25 meets staged at Veteran's Stadium over 100,000 persons passed through the turnstiles.

The popularity of the sport here is not confined to hometown fans. It is a matter of civic pride to realize that thousands of spectators each week come from distant points in New Jersey, Staten Island, Connecticut, Long Island and Philadelphia.

While newspaper, radio and poster publicity have aided immeasureably in the development of racing at Veteran's Stadium to a point far above any other track in the East, it has been word-of-mouth advertising that has proved most effective. The quarter-mile hard-surfaced speedway, the fastest semi-banked racing course in the East, is entirely responsible for this enthusiasm.

Fans come here religiously for every speed program because they know that they get their money's worth; because they know that the country's finest drivers and cars take part in the competition

and because they know that Promoter Flannagan makes an honest effort to give them the best.

An example of the torrid type of competition offered here last season under the banner of the American Racing Drivers Club found 14 top flight drivers sharing honors in the win circle in the 18 events staged. Russ Klar of Long Island, winner of the track championship, headed the list with four main event triumphs. The only other driver to score more than one triumph here was Dutch Schaeffer of Jackson Heights, L. I., who scored two wins the same night with his Golden Arrow Offenhauser.

Others to score feature wins were Mike Nazaruk, ARDC circuit champion; Dee Toran, Shorty McAndrews, Henry Renard, Jim DiMarco, Bill Schindler, Pickles Bickelhaupt, Nick Fornoro, Johnny Zeke, George Ethier, Fred Peters and Bob Disbrow.

In the sensational stock car races on the Bayonne speedway, Al Keller of Rochester, N. Y., and Ray Brown of White Plains, N. Y., were tops with two wins apiece in the seven events staged. Keller scored his victories in the two opening shows and was unable to hit the combination after that. Al Staiger, Ray Nestor and Johnny DuBois were the other feature event winners.

Promoter Flannagan introduced stock car racing around mid-season last year, but rain played havoc with his schedules. While midget auto racing was only rained out twice in 20 scheduled events, stock car racing suffered five washouts in 12 scheduled shows.

So, as the curtain rolls back tonight on the start of another season of super speed on this lightning fast speedway, remember that you are witnessing the finest group of professional racing drivers in the country, a policy that will be maintained.

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
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
